# SHOWHOUSE

Situated on a tree-lined block of Wentworth Street in the heart of Harleston Village, the James Sanders House celebrates modern preservation with a graceful composition of past and present. Raised by its namesake mason in 1851, the three-story Charleston single house maintains original heart-pine floors, lead-glass windows, marble fireplace surrounds, and ribbon moulding. A 2015 renovation renewed the stuccoed brick property with contemporary comforts, including an updated kitchen and saline pool, balancing its 19th-century foundation with 21st-century style. Last spring, the Charleston Symphony Orchestra League, Inc. (CSOL®) teamed up with 14 designers and artisans to reveal its 39th Charleston Symphony Designer Showhouse during a month of tours benefitting the symphony orchestra as well as CSOL® education and scholarship programs. ### First-floor Piazza

ANN YANCY

**The Designer:** With an eye towards mid-century modern design, Ann Yancy launched home décor line Ro Sham Beaux in 2010. The collection is influenced by her international travels and blends timeless sophistication with contemporary style.


**The Room:** Yancy celebrated the iconic Charleston piazza while translating its classical aesthetic to include a more modern vibe. She made the long space more liveable by dividing it into a more formal "foyer" and a relaxed but elegant sitting room anchored by her luxe "Sullivan" collection of outdoor furnishings. An East-meets-West

style merges high design with natural elements in order to blur the boundaries between interior and exterior.

**Outside Influence:** A piazza's dark flooring and shade provide relief from summer's intensity but can also cast the porch into darkness—perk up the space with outdoor lighting and seating in a bright color palette.

### Parlor

SANDRA ERICKSEN

**The Designer:** A member of the Southern Living Designer Network and Best of Houzz 2016 award-winner, Sandra Ericksen has spent more than a decade creating timeless interiors for Lowcountry families.

**The Room:** Ericksen believes the best rooms appear to be collected over time. To that end, she combined classic pieces, such as an impressive antique mirror and Chinese wine tasting table, with current trends like the "live edge" coffee table and chevron hide rug. Bathed in abundant natural light, the room forgoes clutter to emphasize its architectural assets, the Steinway piano, and artwork.

**Get the Picture:** Rather than trying to fit furnishings and décor into a pre-selected palette, allow artwork and architectural elements to guide a room's color story.

# Garden Planters

JENNIFER DECIANTIS

**The Designer:** Jennifer DeCiantis, who studied landscape architecture and architecture at Virginia Tech, with additional studies in Italy and Switzerland, began her career in landscape design in Maryland and Virginia before relocating to Charleston a decade ago. In 2015, she put her broad experience to use in founding DeCiantis Design, LLC.

**The Plantings:** In keeping with the piazza's blend of old and new, traditional and modern, DeCiantis placed classic urns and modern planters, filled with plantings chosen for their texture and color, throughout the garden and piazza to transition and connect the outdoor rooms. 'Rosa plena' camellias with 'Persian Chocolate' *Lysimachia* add a pop of pinkish-red and purple to the entrance, while African iris

with sedum and sansevieria in antique iron planters (left) carry the piazza furnishings into the garden.

**Natural Selection:** Think about proportion, texture, and color when planting a container.

**The Designer:** Boasting more than two decades of design experience in both Chicago and Charleston, Bobbi Jo Engelby works with local artists and craftspeople to infuse every project with classic and trending elements that reflect her clients' personalities.

**The Room:** For a casual yet elegant Lowcountry feel, Engelby introduced texture through lacquered and natural wood finishes, hand-forged metal and brushed gold accents, damask and velvets, and crystal lighting. An array of whites, creams, and grays punctuated by watery blue hues creates an airy backdrop for colorful abstract artwork and handcrafted furniture.

**Circle This:** For optimum traffic flow in a square space, select a round dining table, such as the driftwood-atop-bronze piece, and place in the center of the room.

### Kitchen & Butler's Pantry

**The Designer:** Boasting award-winning work from Kennebunkport to Kiawah, certified kitchen designer Heidi Huddleston delights in providing innovative and cost-effective solutions for kitchens, baths, offices, and residential spaces.

The Room: Juxtaposing a wall of exposed antique brick, full-overlay cabinets in slate enamel embrace a classic aesthetic while providing copious storage that's continued into the pantry. Timeless Carrera marble counters along the kitchen's perimeter balance nicely with a walnut island for additional functionality. Stainless steel appliances, chrome icebox hardware, a pearl ceiling finish, and a subway tile backsplash reflect the room's ample natural light.

**Back Up:** The addition of wallpaper to the rear wall of built-in shelving serves to highlight a carefully curated display of white serving dishes.

**The Curators:** As owners of Charleston Art Brokers, Mary Frances Bishop and Carol Williams guide collectors and designers in viewing, purchasing, and displaying original paintings and photographs by artists in the Southeast.

**The Artisan:** From sweeping staircase handrails to drapery hardware, Knoxville-based blacksmith Kevin Johnson fabricates one-of-a-kind pieces for an array of clients. *The Iron Studio:* (865) 531-3707, theironstudio.com

**The Room:** Benjamin Moore's 2016 Color of the Year, "Simply White" (applied by Ralph Dandridge of Steady Hands Painting), provides the clean canvas for a visual narrative of art that flows naturally from the foyer up the stairwell. Inspired by the work of Phillip Simmons and the musical theme of the symphony, Johnson's hand-forged iron sculpture adds an intriguing detail to the foyer.

### Sitting Room & Bath

TERRY STEPHENSON

**The Designer:** After more than 15 years dealing in European antiques, Terry Stephenson realized her dream of opening a distinctive retail shop last fall. Juxtaposition Home & Garden specializes in unique design elements, including antique and vintage furniture, one-of-a-kind architectural accents, original art, garden statuary, and global textiles.

**The Room:** Drawing inspiration from an antique *suzani* (traditional Uzbek needlework), the designer established a global rhythm in this retreat using a collection of European antiques, muted mid-century art pieces, and contemporary abstracts. A French daybed and Louis XVI-style bergère armchairs invite relaxation, while floating larger furniture pieces away from the walls achieves balance in the asymmetrical room.

**Combine to Design:** To enhance interest in a space, mix different period styles, art genres and sizes, and textures, and then incorporate natural organic elements.

**The Room:** As her muse, the designer envisioned a sailing enthusiast married to a patron of the arts, "a union of Charleston's past and future." The furnishings reflect this interplay of softness and strength, as seen in the luxurious feminine textiles and the masculine framed prints.

**Personal Touch:** As the most intimate room in the house, the master bedroom offers the perfect opportunity to combine the things you love most about yourself and your spouse.

### Dressing Room


HILARY WHITE

The Designer: The youngest winner of East Carolina
University's Alumni of the Year Award for her entrepreneurial
achievements in design, Hilary White has customized interiors
for numerous professional athletes and celebrities, as well as nightclubs and
retail stores in New York City, Memphis, and Mendocino. Her experience also
includes work with ABC's Extreme Makeover: Home Edition and on the MLB
Fan Cave in New York's historic Time Warner building.

**The Room:** The designer layered warm pinks and plenty of texture onto a clean, white-wall canvas to create a sumptuous retreat. Traditional furnishings and a classic rug mix with bold modern art to bring the room to life. The black-and-white art pieces echo the tile floor of the neighboring master bath.

**True Statement:** To unite a room, fill the space with one or two big-impact pieces—an oversize mirror, dramatic chandelier, or large-scale painting—rather than crowding in too many small accessories and furnishings.

### Master Bathroom

**The Designer:** Veteran stylist and tastemaker Lauren Messina has been recognized by national magazines, including *House Beautiful* and *Brides*, for her work on high-end design projects and events in New York and throughout the South. She offers a range of services, from new build and renovation specifications to space planning and décor.

The Room: For a dramatic complement to the striking black-and-white geometric tile floor, the designer painted the base of the pedestal tub a rich black, then softened the room with flowing floor-to-ceiling drapery panels and accents in a soft blush hue. Crystal and polished silver sconces provide traditional-style lighting with a touch of whimsy, and the translucent fixture helps maintain a clear view of the mirror.

**Designer Influence:** Pops of any color juxtaposed with white walls create balance. Don't be afraid to use pink.

### Second-floor Piazza

**The Designer:** Driven by the belief that great interiors happen by design, with planning and communication, residential designer Marian Chatfield has partnered with clients up and down the East Coast on projects ranging from color consultation to new construction.

**The Room:** For a touch of the exotic on this traditional Charleston single house piazza, Chatfield used zebra-patterned rugs to define sitting areas. Pillows and draperies in turquoise and coral tones add subtropical color to simple tailored love seats and lounge chairs covered in charcoal gray. Tucked into one end, a small bistro table and stools serve as a welcome place to enjoy morning coffee.

**Outer Limits:** In a town plagued by springtime pollen, exterior furniture, accessories, and rugs must wipe clean easily.



### Attic Bedrooms & Bath

### TERRI BALDWIN (LEFT) & CHRISTIE SHEALY

The Designers: With an active clientele from Charleston to Pawley's Island, Terri Baldwin has practiced design in the Lowcountry for some 15 years. In 2014, her work graced the cover of the inaugural issue of *Mount Pleasant Home* magazine. Known for her creative energy, design partner Christie Shealy joined TCB design~interiors two years ago.

The Rooms: Nestled onto the third floor, two cozy bedrooms offer an unexpected pied-à-terre for guests. To brighten these petite attic nooks, the designers utilized a soft, airy color palette of blush pink, pale grey, whites, and muted blues and then inserted pops of peacock blue and gold. Lightweight linen draperies, glass and mirrored accessories, metallic highlights, and a delicate beaded chandelier bring lightness to the spaces. A shared bathroom gains character from a custom vanity skirt, towel hooks draped with fringed Turkish towels, and a vintage Persian rug.

**Angling for More:** Rather than visually dividing a room that has slanted walls, paint the walls and ceiling in the same color to make the space feel continuous.


